Greetings from Ralph:

I thought spring was here, but it sure turned cold again yesterday (March 24). At the first MSU Fly-fishing class, several of our students and instructors cut the casting short because of the cold. We had 20 students enrolled, but only 16 were there for the first class. We had about 18 or 19 helpers present. Thanks to all of those helpers and to all those who will help in the next few weeks. **Remember we will not have an April meeting due to the class being taught.** Everyone seemed to like our new location, very spacious and it looks like it will be ideal for videos. I thought the students all were enthusiastic about the class.

March was busy, with the Sowbug and the MSU classes beginning and it looks like April will be the same. We had 4 or 5 tyers from MTFA at the Sowbug and I ran into several other friends. Fished the Norfolk Friday morning and Saturday evening and the White Sunday morning. Landed nothing of great size, but those I did land on my new TFO 4 weight proved lots of fun. I fooled them all with my soft hackles! The upper White, just below Bull Shoals Dam was covered with whitish algae that I confirmed was didymo.

On March 21, I went to the "open house" on didymo at Bennett Spring. I was disappointed in the format; there were a few areas set up with information, several people from the state to answer questions, and a survey they wanted us to complete. There was not any presentation of any type. They did have two vials of alga, one algae was white (didymo) and the other was green (false didymo). This is where I became sure that what I saw below Bull Shoals was didymo. My comment on the survey was that cleaning equipment was more important than eliminating felt soles. I usually wear rubber soles, but I don't believe everyone should have to go out and buy new boots now. It does look like when you buy new boots in the future, felt may not be an option because of the manufacturers.

There is a pre-derby meeting March 26 and I'll put information about the derby somewhere else in the newsletter. I'll also have the didymo "fact sheet" either here in the newsletter or if there isn't room, I'll have several copies at the May meeting.

Did you know? By Ralph Eichholz

When the Federal Convention, meeting in Philadelphia in 1787 took a break from July 26 until August 6, to allow a detail committee to report back with a draft that George Washington, president of the convention went fishing. On four days during that time his diary entry talked about his fishing on those days. But his big success in fishing was his commercial fishing. It was the consistently the most profitable of his commercial endeavors in Fairfax County.

Three presidents, Jimmy Carter (*An Outdoor Journal*), Grover Cleveland, (*Fishing and Shooting Sketches*) and Herbert Hoover (*Fishing for Fun*) wrote books about fishing.

When the president goes to Camp David, the press is allowed in for the landing and the departure of the helicopter, but then must leave immediately. When Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter flew in, they would often wait for the press to depart and then they would get back on the copter and fly to the farm of Wayne Harpster in Pennsylvania to fish for the weekend. According to Mrs. Carter, the press never knew they left the compound.

When Carter lost the 1980 election to Ronald Reagan and returned to Plains, Georgia he discovered two prized bamboo rods had been stolen. When he went fishing with Wayne Harpster on Spruce Creek, he and his friends commiserated more on the loss of the rods than on the election.

George Bush, his son Jeb and Prime Minister of Canada, Brian Mulroney where fishing for blues and having a great day catching. Jeb's bail was not working properly and Jeb made a bad cast. His Rapala plug pierced his father's ear, the barb going all the way through. The Prime Minister said "Gosh, we'd better go in and get that attended to." President Bush replied "Jeez, we don't get fishing like this very often; we're not going in now." One of the secret service men clipped the barb, pulled the hook back through and they kept fishing.

These came from the book *Fishing with the Presidents* by Bill Mares. The book is a collection of anecdotes, political cartoons from the president's time, and lots of photographs of the president's fishing experiences. It was published in 1999, so the most recent presidents aren't included. I thought the book was humorous, and gave another aspect of many of our leaders. I really enjoyed the pictures. If you like history, I believe you would enjoy this book. Although the author is a fly fisherman, he wasn't prejudiced by his preference. There are several quotes from the presidents and the work is well documented (I just ignored most of the footnotes). Most of you history buffs will recognize the name Steven E. Ambrose; author and presidential historian. His simple review was "Bill Mares has written a unique book about the fishing habits of the United States presidents-good, bad, or indifferent. A fly fisherman himself, he writes with vigor and perception, When you read his book, you too will be hooked."

This is another book in my collection that if you would like to read and can't find, I could probably be persuaded to lend out. I've also a copy of *An Outdoor Journal*, but I think that could be found in most community libraries.

Rock Snot Prevention

The latest invader to threaten Missouri sounds awful, and it could be even worse than its name. *Didymosphenia geminata*, commonly known as “didymo” or “rock snot,” is a type of algae that forms dense mats on stream bottoms. It has gained footholds in streams worldwide, including some of the most revered trout waters on Earth. The infestation nearest to Missouri is in the White River just south of the Missouri-Arkansas border.

The jury is still out concerning didymo’s possible ecological effects. It definitely is bad news for anglers, though. Stringy algae threads catch on hooks from dry flies to crankbaits, making fishing nearly impossible.

MDC has been holding public open-house forums to help educate anglers and boaters about rock snot. The last of these will take place at 6 p.m. April 7 at the Emory Melton Inn and Conference Center at Roaring River State Park and at 6 p.m. April 11 at the James Memorial Library, 300 W. Scioto St., St. James.

Contamination of recreational equipment, such as boats, life jackets and fishing gear, particularly waders, is the most common way for didymo to spread. MDC is considering regulation changes to reduce this risk, but Missourians can take preventive action on their own right now.

To avoid spreading rock snot, remember: **“Check. Clean. Dry.”**

- Check all gear and equipment and remove any visible algae. Do not dispose of algae by putting it down a drain or into bodies of water.

- Clean all gear and equipment with a solution of 2-percent bleach, 5-percent saltwater or dish detergent. Allow all equipment to stay in contact with the solution for at least one minute. Soak all soft items, such as felt-soled waders and life jackets, in the solution for at least 20 minutes.
- Dry all gear and equipment in the sun for at least 48 hours.
- Replacing felt-soled waders with rubber-soled models also reduces the risk of spreading rock snot and other invasive species.
