Fishing Reports from Kim Schultz: December 4, 2021 (Saturday): I drove into the park (Montauk SP) and arrived at 8 AM. I parked near the hatchery building and made my way to the stream (Current River). Within the first hour, I came across a doe and two fawns. A bald eagle flew overhead and perched just up steam from me. On the opposite bank, I watched a mink hunting for a meal. Several muskrats were in the vegetation (water cress) taking nourishment. I used #18 (PMD) dry flies fishing them on top and sometimes pulled them under the water after the fly drifted down stream. It was a pleasant day, sunny with the temperature in low 60s. I finished the day with 27 fish to hand. The largest trout was 17". A pileated woodpecker took to a tree a few yards from me, I was able to walk up to him as he ate dried berries from the tree, I was able to get a video of him. I stayed for the St. Louis MTFA Christmas party then drove 2.5 hours home. It's a hard one-day trip, I would recommend staying a night or two at the park. The lodge can provide dining/meals which I find to be very good. I plan to make another trip in January.

December 6, 2021(Monday): I went to Bennett SP today, no one else fishing above the dam to the Holland dam. I started fishing before 10 AM. The wind was blowing up stream, a brisk north wind. The air temperature was thirty-four with sunny conditions. The PMD hatch started at noon, and I had a good two hours of fishing with dry flies (PMD). No one fished the area while I was there. One eagle did a fly over. Fished to the whistle that blew at 4 PM. I finished with 19 trout to hand.

December 12, 2021(Monday): I drove seventy miles from my house to Roaring River SP today. The weather was fair with sunny skies. The wind was not a factor. I fished the two pools below the handicap ramp, and with the path of the sun, the area was under shade all day due to the bluff on the opposite bank. I could see plenty of fish, few midges in the air and very little surface activity for the morning and did not get into fish until 2 PM. The best fly was a PMD parachute #18. I caught one fish over sixteen, the rest were typical stockers with 26 trout for the day. My last cast last trout came 15 minutes before the whistle blew and I noticed club members Todd and Donna Christell fishing downstream from me. We chat for half an hour as we left the stream and walked back to our vehicles.

December 17, 2021(Friday): I left Springfield a little after 8 AM and in the water by 9:30. I fished above the dam in zone 1 and hoping for a PMD hatch before noon. The #18 dry fly (PMD) was on a 6X tippet, and I worked my way up stream looking for top water trout. It was a cool with several light showers throughout the day. There were only a few fishermen in the water on this Friday, which did not surprise me due to the weather. I saw only a few mayflies on the surface with the wind and current sending them down stream and towards river right bank. A few trout were taking them but had a hard time convincing them to take my fly. Many of the trout were at my feet looking for food as I waded along looking for better fishing. I stayed in zone 1 till 2:30 PM and then walked down stream past the bridge hoping for trout willing to take my fly. I stayed with the #18 PMD and after the cast across the stream let it stay on top then pull it under quarter down. Most of my drifts either missed a fish or brought a trout to hand. For the next hour, many trout were caught and released. I finished the day with 34 trout to hand. I did see a mink and a pair of eagles come in late to perch in the sycamore tree near the hatchery making passes and taking trout out of the raceways. I fished until the whistle blew (4 PM) and drove home in the rain. It was a good day to fish.

December 20, 2021 (Monday): The weather forecast for today was frost until 10 AM. So, I left Spring-field a littler later and arrived Bennett Spring SP around 10 AM. It was a sunny day with the air temperature above freezing as temperatures increasing to high 40's. The wind from the southeast, blew downstream. I started in zone 1 fishing the "slough" water above the dam. The mayflies would emerge from this area and float out into open water. The hatch was light with the trout taking all the mayflies I saw on the water. I left zone 1 around 1 PM and walked down stream to another favorite spot. The trout were not as willing to take my fly as was the case on Friday with 22 trout caught on this day. The largest rainbow was 24" caught with a #20 PMD dry on 2 lbs. tippet just before the whistle blew, so the day ended on a good fish.



From Kim Schultz's post on December 20, 2021 (Monday):

After the whistle blew, I walked back to the truck and saw an eagle fly upstream and perched himself on a limb of a sycamore tree across the stream. I walked down to the stream to get a better view and a video as he left the tree to fly back downstream. I went back to the truck to take off my waders and stowed away the rod and reel. As, I was about to leave the park, three deer crossed the road near the dining lodge and park store. I was able to park the truck get out and walk up to the six deer, taking a

December 27, 2021 (Monday): I drove to Bennett Spring SP with the most people I've seen for this catch and release season. The day was sunny with a north wind, air temperature in high forties. The mayfly hatch was minimal, only a few seen all day. Later in the day the midges were swarming in a few areas. I fished above the dam (zone 1) using a stubby PMD pulled under and fished wet, later in the day fished it dry. There was enough wind to ripple the water surface to provide a little cover for the trout and me. There were three passes by a mature bald eagle. Several trout 16" with 29 trout to hand. On the drive home, saw a dozen deer feeding along roads and in pastures, filling up before the next front.

I am sure the weather will turn cold in January, and I plan to be there to see the fog lift off the water with rod guides freezing, and fingertips going numb. May sound foolish, but I enjoy days with very few fishermen on the water and snowflakes falling gently on the water. Tight lines.... Kim Schultz



Dick Solomon: "Fished Bennet Springs yesterday [12/13/21], and overall fishing was at best mediocre. When I arrived @0730 the park was mostly empty. There were two guys suited up and clamping at the bit to get in the water at 0800. I had some new flys to try and couldn't decide so I went with a new pellet fly that Mike Kidd introduced me to. It was not a game changer to start with but caught on later. The two early birds were throwing Dry's and were not catching much. I moved down stream from them away from the Gut Hole and hooked up with my Shammy Worm jig. It was the best fly of the day but still not very productive. When the park started to get busy I shifted up to zone one away from the Surf Rods and Rooster Tails. I thought it was FLYS ONLY in all zones but what do I know. Anyway up to the Zone One Gut Hole< by the handicap pier, it wasn't much better, but it was not infiltrated by the Surf rods yet. As the morning got warmer and surprisingly the crowd didn't pickup I noticed one fella catching several in the shallow water, I was standing on the Pier waiting for my waders to dry out and I asked him what he was using and he said the SMALLEST FLY he had. Well I tied on a size 20 dry and zippo no luck, My tippet was too big and I didn't want to change so I was pretty dry and it was close to 12 and I headed to my truck, on the way I stopped by to chat with the guy and look at his fly, duh, he was using a MIDGE AND A SPARKLEY dropper above it. In my 40 odd yrs fishing that hole I have never fished a Midge in that shallow area. Live and Learn. I might add that from the start at the HORN there was a Hatch going on and from my position on the pier and had a great view, the fish were real close to the top of the water, they just didn't like my flys. As I was leaving I stopped and watch a fellow fishing a New Zealand Indicator. He made 4 or 5 casts way out in the stream beyond the Moss Beds fishing about 4 ft deep and every cast was hooking up, he was out pretty deep in the water so I didn't ask or see his fly. That's my story and I'm sticking to it. "

Fly Talk:

The Tied Fly Recipe:

Size 12 dry fly hook, standard

length

Thread: Black

Body: Black dubbing


Rib: Black wire

Tail/back: Black flash straws

Wings: Swiss Straw Head: Tan dubbing

Eyes: (Optoinal) Bead chain





As shown here on the left, they can be tied in various sizes and colors. The horizontal scale line at the lower left corner of this diagram is 1 cm or roughly 3/8".

How to make your flies ride "hook up" with smaller dumbbell eyes:

Heavy flies can be hard to cast or sink too fast. Rather that adding bigger dumbbell eyes for weight, you can go with smaller, better proportioned eyes by using this technique of adding a "lift kit" to change the center of gravity of your fly.


For those of you who are less tech savy or too cantankerous to bother looking it up on-line, the idea is to double some monofilament and place it on top of the shank to add a little distance between the hook and the eyes. This will change the center of gravity of the fly.
