"A Fly in my Email", by Dennis Stead



Recipe: #18 scud hook

Head: 5/64" tungsten bead

Thread: 140 fl. Green thread, 6/0 black thread, 6/0 red thread

Ribbing: Olive/brown V-rib small or other color

Collar: Peacock hurl or peacock dubbing

Start thread and tie in 6-8 wraps near head

Tie in V-rib

Wrap thread down the shank past curve making sure V-rib is either on top or side of hook, not both Continue wrapping thread until a tapered body is achieved and all of V-rib is covered Wrap thread forward near the bead, leaving room for the collar, whip finish thread and cut Tie in black 6/0 thread and dub a very sparse collar, wrap, and whip finish.

Bob's Bits and Pieces, from Bob Randall

NO FISHING!: The "Catch and Keep" season in the state trout parks will come to a close this year on October 31. The "Catch and Release" season will not begin until November 9 and will be open until February 11, 2019 (C&R is 8-4 Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday only). That means that you are not allowed to fish at any of these parks from November 1 through November 8. Another thing to keep in mind is that during the "C&R" season, you will not need to purchase a daily permit. You still need a fishing license and trout permit. You can, of course, fish for trout below the Table Rock Dam in Lake Taneycomo and other trout waters with the usual rules applied.

A feminine advantage in fly fishing: Trout Unlimited has an online blog. Someone started a discussion about women beginning fly fishers. One of the posts said this in part: "Women learn to cast much quicker than men. According to the two fly shops here, men begin by overpowering their casts and find learning the rhythm of casting far more difficult than women." Not only should this be inspirational to female fly fishers but it should tell the guys something about their own casting techniques. John Falb, Dallas, TX, gave his permission to use his post in our newsletter.

Clean Water: A Trout Unlimited Online Forum discussion is about clean water. One of the posts talked about how a game warden in South Carolina studied alligators. The Medical University of South Carolina heard about it and "began taking blood samples from theses alligators in the North and South Santee Rivers. This brackish water well down river from all the water treatment plants damns etc. This is the water that feeds all the old rice plantations that are now duck hunting camps etc. People fish, shrimp, hunt, boat, birdwatch, camp, and generally any outdoor recreational activity you can think of.


The most alarming finding is these alligators are full of shampoo residues, plastic residues, birth control metabolites, digoxin (a heart medicine) metabolites. These are breakdown products not the medicines themselves. This means people are taking their meds, breaking them down, and urinating out the byproducts that are getting through the water treatment systems. It's NOT people pouring their meds down the drain." It is interesting to note that "plastic residues" were found. That's good information for the next time a discussion of waste plastic (straws come to mind) comes up and someone brushes it off as "fake news". You say you don't care about alligators in South Carolina? We're all downstream and so are the fish we pursue. If that still doesn't get your attention, "A new study finds 73 percent of mesopelagic fish (living at depths of 200-1,000 meters) caught in the Northwest Atlantic had microplastics in their stomachs..." "Now, in the first study of its kind, researchers from Austria have discovered the presence of microplastics in human ... (feces) as well."

Stocking from rail cars: We often talk about how Crane Creek was stocked with McCloud rainbows a century ago from railroad cars stopped on the railroad trestles. See this vintage photo of a fish car. From 1881 to 1947, the U.S. Fish Commission delivered fish to private as well as public applicants throughout the United States on specially designed train cars like this one. The cars had water tanks, aeration devices, cooling systems, and bunks for the attendants among other things. Notice the cans look like the milk cans used years ago by dairy farmers to ship milk to the local dairy.



Chili Feed: The Springfield Chapter held its annual chili feed on Saturday, October 20, at the Shepherd of the Hills Hatchery Pavilion. Some members fished before and after with varying results. 
